Response before the Gospel: Glory be to thee, O Lord.

In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has

come near." This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said,

"The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.'"

Now John wore clothing of camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then the people of Jerusalem and all Judea were going out to him, and all the region along the Jordan, and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

But when he saw many Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruit worthy of repentance. Do not presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.

"I baptize you with water for repentance, but one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing floor and will gather his wheat into the granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

At St. Elizabeth's we offer God's blessing to everyone during the celebration of the Holy Eucharist. All baptized Christians are invited to receive the consecrated bread and wine, either standing or kneeling. Gluten-free hosts are available upon request. Those who are not baptized or who prefer not to receive are invited to receive a blessing in the name of God. Simply cross your arms over your chest as a sign to the Eucharistic Ministers.

The parish clergy will bring the consecrated bread to you after the Eucharistic prayer. You may either remain standing or kneel at your pew, and they will place the host in your open hand. Consecrated wine will not be distributed during this time. The clergy will be sanitizing their hands prior to serving communion.

Please take a moment to sanitize your hands with the hand sanitizer available in the pews.

After the priest has served everyone in your row, you may momentarily remove your mask to consume the consecrated bread before replacing your mask. Gluten-free hosts are available when needed; simply tell the priest when they come to you.

If you would prefer to receive a blessing only, please cross your arms over your chest as a sign to the priest.

After you have received the Holy Eucharist, you may sit or kneel in your pew.

Journey through Advent Series We will be offering a 3 week Advent series in the Parish Hall on Monday, December 5th, 12th, and 19th. We will gather for dinner at 5:45. Formation will begin at 6:30. We will finish at 7:20. There will be activities for children provided. The Advent season guides us in preparing for the birth of Jesus Christ, as well as the second coming. During Advent and Christmas, we share with those who witnessed and experienced the birth of Jesus as we remember the story. We ourselves live between the first coming of Jesus and the second. The Christmas story is the story of the incarnation, the story of God breaking into the human story. Each session will include information and discussion on the various individuals from these stories such as Jesus, Mary, Joseph, the Shepherds, and the Wise Men.

We will take a look at scripture readings from the first 2 Chapters of Matthew and Luke to set the framework for the topics being discussed each session. The journeys of the individuals in the nativity story as well as their circumstances and context will be explored along with our own unique journeys and experiences. We will explore major themes of these stories and our faith as we walk through this Advent season. The children's activities will include break-out sessions based on the themes and discussions from the adult formation session. A video of each session will be uploaded to our YouTube channel for those who would prefer to listen online or cannot make every session.

December *Faith and Film* — Sunday, December 4 One Sunday each month we will gather to watch a movie and have a brief discussion following the film. Movies will be shown in the Parish Hall at 4:00 p.m., and popcorn and refreshments will be provided. The movie is about an angel (Grant) who comes to earth to help a bishop (Niven) and his wife (Young) raise money for their church. This movie is considered to be an underrated Christmas classic! In a cold, cold winter's night



WE ARE TURNING 100

Thank you for joining us this morning for Sunday services at our historic church, affectionately known as “the chapel on the hill” from the day we opened our doors nearly 100 years ago.
